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Detective Forrest Clevestine of the New Berlin Police Department was the guest speaker at our July 25th General Membership Meeting. He emphasized the importance of talking to kids about the potential dangers involved with online internet networking. "Beware of the online world. Once something is out there, it is out there forever."

Det. Clevestine is an 18-year veteran with the NBPD. He is widely recognized for his keen knowledge of the Anthony Stancl "sexting sextortion" case that unfolded in New Berlin. He has given presentations on the subject to hundreds involved in law enforcement. In his presentation, he detailed the timeline involved, unique aspects of the crime and associated challenges and successes of the case.

This case attracted national media attention at the time involved Stancl, 19, of New Berlin. In 2008, Stancl had posed as a female on Facebook and persuaded over 30 boys to send him naked pictures of themselves. He then used the pictures against them as a threat to show them to everyone in New Berlin Eisenhower High School. He then blackmailed at least seven boys, ages 15 to 17, into performing sex acts.

In February 2010, Stancl was sentenced to 15 years in prison and another 13 years of extended supervision.

Det. Clevestine addressed the question of how can communities prepare for the realities of "sexting sextortion", he had these suggestions:

- Increase collaboration between police and schools.
- Build a strong working relationship before an incident occurs.
- Training and awareness for school staff.
- Research technology for schools and law enforcement that exposes internet crime.
- Seek to eliminate the "not in my community" attitude of false security.
- Continuing education for students and parents concerning the danger of online predators.
- Frequent community presentations addressing internet use safety.



In closing, Detective Clevestine drove home the points "beware of the online world" and be smart. Because once it is out there, it's out there forever for anyone to see. You cannot take it back.

"HEAD DOWN, HANDS ON THE SEAT IN FRONT OF YOU!"

Last month we were asked to help the new combined SWAT team from eight cities to refine their skills. This day was for hostages on a bus, members from several cities took part in this training as both hostages and bad guys. These were more realistic with the use of simulation ammo.

There were 11 exercises, the first three involved a shooter on the bus in plain sight, and the SWAT assault team's job was to neutralize the shooter without injury to the hostages. All three exercises resulted in the hostages unharmed and the gunman taken down with shots to the head and upper body.

The next three exercises involved the shooter hidden behind the bus seats with hostages and then jumping up and trying to shoot the SWAT team, a few of the bad guys did get off shots but did not hit any officers or hostages, again the gunman was killed by the SWAT assault team and no hostages were hit by team fire.

The next few exercises had a shooter hiding in the seats with a baby. When the shooter stood to shoot he held the baby in front of him, thereby making the SWAT team to only make head shots to avoid hitting the baby. All teams completed this with no shots hitting the baby or hostages.

The last exercise was a full assault on the bus, but being able to damage the bus by breaking windows and shooting in through the broken windows. The hostages and bus were covered in shattered glass and the shooter was taken down with no injury to the hostages.



In all these exercises whether you were the hostage or shooter your heart was pounding as if it were real. Along with that, each team was reviewed after the assault to see where each shot from the team landed. The bus company then had a cook out for all the officers and civilians. We also received thanks from the officers for helping them refine their skills with real people verses just stepping through the scenarios. All had a good time.

WAUKESHA COMMUNICATION CENTER TOUR

On Saturday, August 24th, members of NBPCAAA had the opportunity to visit the Waukesha Communication Center (WCC) to see how the 911 service works in New Berlin.

Can you multi-task, answer the phone, talk on the radio, read maps, listen to other conversations and type all at the same time? If you can, you could work at the WCC. The WCC handles calls for many cities, police, fire and the sheriff at the same time. They also control the weather sirens for many cities. This is done 24/7, 365 days a year, with 40+ employees. The WCC is the backup center for Milwaukee, with the fire that Milwaukee had last month, they handled all calls for emergency service until their call center was back up and running.

They can pinpoint a cell call and follow it even if it is moving, so when you call with an emergency on the road they can send the correct agency to where you are, they also know where all of the officers and EMS personal

are at any given time, to get the quickest response to the call. Procedures are in place with the police and fire departments to instruct them what personal to send for that call. They have procedures with a checklist for 911 calls to give help before emergency personal have arrived, example: possible heart attack, things to ask and things for you to do to help keep that person alive until help arrives. With all this going on, they will still be answering other calls and either responding to them or transferring them to someone else to handle.

All calls to the center are written up and reviewed to be sure that the proper procedures are followed. This was a great opportunity to see what a great job a few hard working people do to keep us safe. They do not get the credit that other out in front emergency personnel get due to them being behind the scenes to the public eye.
